January 12 - "The U.S. Census - Thirteen Things You Probably Didn't Know"

- The speaker will be Jack Butler, experienced genealogist and lecturer. The U.S. Census is typically one of the very first research resources that a new genealogist encounters – and with good reason. The collection of U.S. Census reports constitutes the single largest collection of information about our American ancestors in the 19th and 20th centuries. Unfortunately, many of its excellent clues are routinely missed by researchers. This presentation is designed to help you fully utilize this great resource. It addresses where and how to find the information most frequently missed by genealogists, and how to take advantage of what you find.



Library Report Jamie Johnson, Library Chair

The following are the latest books given by the genealogy society to the

Lakes Region Library. These books are located in the Genealogy Section of the Lakes Region Library on Druid St. in Inverness. You may request a book be sent to the Library nearest you.

Unofficial Guide to FamilySearch.org – How to Find Your Family History on the World's Largest Free Genealogy Website by Dana McCullough, GEN 929.1 MCC, 239 pages

FamilySearch.org is a free website operated by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. It has more than 3.5 billion names in its searchable collections and more records are continually being added. To take advantage of all of the tools on the FamilySearch.org web site, you need to register for an account, but it is free.

This book tells you how to establish your account, create and manage your own family tree on FamilySearch.org., search other family trees and access all of the many records that have been added to Family Search. There are also step-by-step strategies to find ancestors fast and practical pointers for locating your ancestors in record collections that aren't searchable. The book contains detailed overviews of their major U.S. collections and guidance for using their vast record collections from Europe, Canada, Mexico and 100-plus countries around the world.

The book also explains how to utilize user-submitted genealogies, 200,000 digitized family history books, and the FamilySearch catalog of 2.4 million offline resources you can borrow through a local FamilySearch Center. Worksheets and checklists are included at the back of the book to track your research progress as well as examples of the types of records found. Whether you're new to FamilySearch.org or you're a longtime user, this book provides the guidance you need to discover your ancestors and make the most of the site's valuable resources.

Dana McCullough, the author, is a former editor at Family Tree Magazine. She is a freelance writer and editor who frequently writes and edits content on genealogy and higher education topics. She has a bachelor's degree in journalism from Iowa State University.

Searching for Your Ancestors in Historic Newspapers by Claudia C. Breland, GEN 929.1 BRE, 286 pages

The author begins the book by listing the various treasures in newsprint such as obituaries, birth announcements, engagement and marriages, land sales, bankruptcies, and many others, and explaining how to find the newspaper you need. The book has chapters with regard to free newspaper databases, subscription databases, libraries and their resources, and microfilm and interlibrary loans. The end of the book is a State by State listing of historic newspapers arranged by public and university libraries with indexes, genealogy and historical societies with indexes, digitized newspaper collections, as well as a number of international newspapers.

Claudia Breland is a member of the Association of Professional Genealogists, the National Genealogical Society, and various local and state genealogical societies in the State of Washington. She has a Master's degree in Library Science.

The Genealogist's Guide to Researching Tax Records by Carol Cooke Darrow, CG and Susan Winchester, Ph.D., C.P.A., GEN 929.1 GEN, 166 pages

Everyone pays taxes, thereby creating records. Chapters one and two of this book give you the techniques to locate, read, and understand the various tax records that have been created over the years. Subsequent chapters explain how to apply those techniques in researching head or poll taxes, real estate taxes, personal property taxes, federal taxes, inheritance taxes, school taxes, liquor taxes, and a variety of miscellaneous taxes. Tax records are especially helpful for the period before the first U.S. Census in 1790 and for the period between 1880 and 1900.

This book contains examples of the various tax records, bibliographies of research sources and selected tax records, and a subject index.

Carol Cooke Darrow is a Certified Genealogist who teaches and lectures in Denver, CO. Susan Winchester became interested in historical tax records while studying at the University of Denver's Graduate Tax Program and is a volunteer at a local Family History Center.

Genealogy Magazines in the Lakes Region Library, Inverness

The genealogy society subscribes to the following genealogy magazines and donates them to the Lakes Region Library in Inverness to make them available for your use. The *Internet Genealogy* magazine, *Your Genealogy Today* (formerly *Family Chronicle*) and *American Ancestors* magazines are located behind the reference desk. If you can't find them, just ask one of the librarians. The following are descriptions of interesting articles from recent magazines.

Internet Genealogy Dec/Jan 2016

"Overseas Newspaper Archives" by David A. Norris, pp13 – 16. He provides the websites of newspapers from many countries such as Spain, France, Austria, Germany, Norway, Netherlands, Sweden, Wales, Mexico, Australia and New Zealand. For example, the London Gazette has been publishing since 1665: www.thegazette.co.uk

"Finding Revolutionary War Newspapers" by David A. Norris. "By 1783, 43 newspapers were in operation in the newly independent United States." However, many copies were lost. He gives tips on how to supplement your research with newspapers from the Revolutionary era. He provides a list of newspaper collections that can be found online for free. For example, the Virginia Gazette, 1736 – 1780: http://research.history.org/DigitalLibrary

"Eddies Extracts, a Northern Ireland Resource"

by Cindy Thomson – "A great resource for researching Northern Irish roots, particularly around Belfast." It is free online and lists birth, marriage and death announcements from newspapers, book extracts, records of deceased seamen and more.

Our Canada Our Stories – Notre Canada Nos Histoires

In 2017 Canada will celebrate its 150th anniversary as a nation. Canadians everywhere are asked to record their personal, family and community histories. Visit www.canada150.ca for details and to upload a story and photo.

"Have you Reached a Brick Wall in Your Native American Research?" by Stuart Doyle, pp 22 – 26. He provides strategies and resources for overcoming difficulties in Indian Research. "The U.S. Indian Census Roll, 1885 – 1940 (found online) lists Indians who maintained a formal affiliation with a tribe under federal supervision." "Dawes Commission Enrollment records give names of those who in 1930 Indian Act went to Oklahoma land designated as Indian Territory." The focus is usually on the Five Civilized Tribes (Creek, Choctaw, Chickasaw, Cherokee and Seminole) and other tribes are often overlooked.

American Ancestors Vol. 16, #4, Fall issue

"A Long Shadow of Doubt: Pirates and Captives in Atlantic History," by Gregory N. Flemming, pp 24 – 30. "The summer of 1725 was the end of the most destructive and deadly decade in the history of Atlantic piracy, a period when trading vessels and fishing boats were captured by lawless sea bandits at the rate of one or two a week." In addition to raiding the ships, the sailors were often forced to join the pirate crew or be killed. "The only way the captives could get away from the pirates was to escape or revolt." Read about the rebellion of the captives and their return to Boston.

"Clues from the Coroner," by Meldon J. Wolfgang III, pp 60-61. Coroners investigated unexpected or suspicious deaths and the reports give details of the deaths and often other information of genealogical value.

New England Online Database

The New England Online Database is free to use at the Lakes Region Library in Inverness but you must use the computers at the library. Also you must have a library card. On the computer click on **Library Info**, **Databases** and then **American Ancestors**.

Access Newspaper Archives Database

Features billions of articles from historical newspapers around the U.S. and the world. This database is free in the Family History Center of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Hours: Tuesday, Wednesday 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Thursday 9 a.m. to noon.

Use GenDisasters.com to Find Out What May Have Happened to Your Family

GenDisasters.com is a genealogy site that contains information on the historic disasters, events, and tragic accidents our ancestors endured, as well as, information about their life and death.

Database and records are searchable by surname as well as by the name of a disaster or by Year or by U.S. State. A separate section of the site contains information about disasters in Canada. I don't think the site has every disaster but it certainly describes many. If you are wondering why a family member abruptly disappeared, you might want to check this site. Also, some families had to relocate after a disaster, such as floods or late spring blizzards that destroyed newly-planted crops. GenDisasters may be found at http://www3.gendisasters.com. Elephind can be a great **FREE** resource for anyone who wishes to search old newspapers. The purpose of elephind.com is to make it possible to search all of the world's digital newspapers from one place and at one time. Elephind.com allows you to simultaneously search across thousands of articles using key words

and phrases. <u>www.Elephind.com</u> presently contains 141,831,915 items from 2,704 newspaper titles.




